



**Queens Ferry 12 Vulcan Lane**  
Built 1858 as a general store, granted a liquor licence in 1865, and often frequented by journalists. Named after owner John Robertson's home of Queen's Ferry, near Edinburgh.

**O'Carroll's Irish Bar 10 Vulcan Lane**  
Probably the result of a 1900's modernisation. It has been offices, a music business, and, during the 1950s - 1970s, a coffee lounge.

**Occidental 6-8 Vulcan Lane**  
Built on the site of a forge, opened in 1870 by American sailor Edward Perkins, with a bar, accommodation, reading room, billiard room, café and a museum of curios. Demolished 1884 for the present building. Interior adapted by Belgian brewers Stella Artois in 1999.

**Imperial cnr Queen St & Fort St**  
Once close to the foreshore, there has been a hotel on this site since the 1860s. The present building was designed in 1883 by E Mahoney & Sons. From the 1890s it housed offices for the Harbour Board and Gas Board.

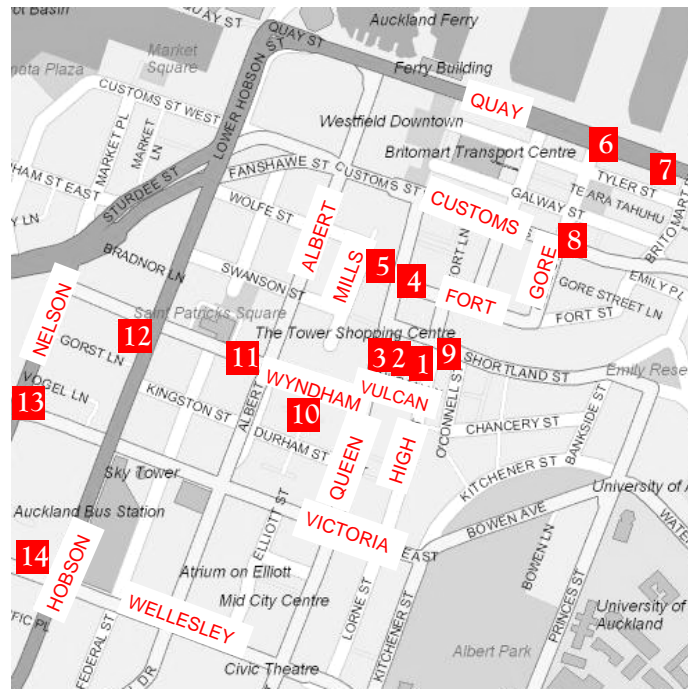

**Tabac 6 Mills Lane**  
Established in 1997, this bar is located at the back of the Gilfillan's Building, the second oldest building in Queen Street, built in 1865.

**Northern Steamship Co 122 Quay St**  
Opened in 1899, a third level was added in 1921 to provide accommodation, a laundry and more offices. Macs Brewbar was established here in 2006.

**Brew on Quay 102 Quay St**  
Built 1904, designed by Charles Arnold, first occupied by the Colonial Sugar Refining Company. From 1961 -1993 it was the Wharf Police Station.

**Rose & Crown cnr Gore St & Customs St East**  
Original site a boatyard in 1860. Current building dates from 1876 and was remodelled extensively after a fire in 1903.

**Hotel De Brett 2 High St**  
The site of Auckland's first hotel, built in 1841. Current building rebuilt in 1925, recently refurbished as a boutique luxury hotel with several bars.

**Bluestone Room 9-11 Durham Lane**

Built 1861 as a warehouse for Bernhard Levy & Nathan Goldwater, Auckland's oldest extant commercial building.

**Shakespeare cnr Wyndham St & Albert St**

Est. 1898 by Thomas Foley, popular with farmers, as it was close to the sale yards, micro-brewery established in 1986.

**Muddy Farmer cnr Wyndham St & Hobson St**

The former Farmers department store, closed in the early 1990s, now houses an Irish pub.

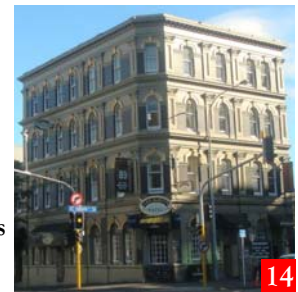


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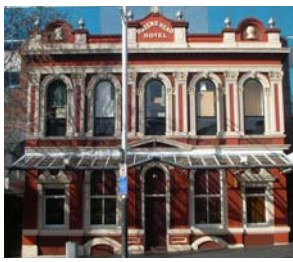
**Empire cnr Victoria/Nelson Sts**  
In 1885 Irishman Patrick Gleeson was the first of many owners. In the 1960s, the home of some well-known criminals, today frequented by people from the nearby TV studios.

**Albion 119 Hobson St**  
Designed by E Mahoney and built in 1864 and still offering accommodation.

**Queens Head 404 Queen St**  
 Built in 1868 by Henry Adams.  
 It fell victim to façadism in the  
 1980s, a mirror glass tower being  
 built behind the historic façade.  
 Recently a Japanese Restaurant.



**Drake 2 Drake St**  
 Built by Michael Dervan in 1857,  
 a wooden building on the fore-  
 shore, named the Freeman's Bay  
 Hotel. Destroyed by fire, replaced  
 by the present building in 1886.

**Birdcage cnr Franklin Rd  
 & College Hill**  
 Aka the Rob Roy Hotel,  
 built 1886 and temporarily  
 moved 40 metres in August  
 2010 to make way for the  
 Victoria Park Tunnel.



**Cavalier 68 College Hill**  
 Formerly the Suffolk,  
 built in the late 1860s,  
 first licensed in 1865,  
 one of Auckland's longest  
 standing original wooden  
 hotels.

**Naval & Family cnr K Rd  
 & Pitt St**  
 Previously the Crest, now  
 Calendar Girls. Built 1895,  
 the first licensed premises on  
 K Rd.



**Windsor Castle 144 Parnell Rd**  
 A pub has been on this site since  
 1847. Italianate style alterations  
 were made in the 1880s.



**City Club Hotel**  
 Built in Shortland St as a  
 drapery store and known  
 as Victoria House, it was  
 first licensed in 1865. The  
 elaborate façade was added  
 in 1889 and the hotel was  
 demolished in 1966.



**Fitzroy 75-77 Wakefield St**  
 Built 1854-5, it operated as a pub  
 until 1909, a boarding house until  
 the 1950s, when it became home  
 to the Wakefield Press, publisher  
 of many of NZ's leading poets.



**Globe**  
 Cnr Wakefield &  
 Mount Sts, a venue  
 for live music and  
 poetry, popular  
 with students, it  
 was demolished in  
 the late 1990s.



**Palace Hotel (formerly Aurora)**  
 The original hotel on this site, cnr Victoria & Federal Sts,  
 dated from c.1852, rebuilt 1890s. Additions over the years  
 included a third storey. Demolished overnight in January 2011  
 when renovations for a brothel caused it to become unstable.
